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

February's Meeting - Screening "Tracing Roots"

A heartfelt glimpse into the world of Haida elder and weaver, Delores Churchill and a discussion generating documentary about the multilayered meaning of an object.

Tracing Roots is a portrait of an artist and a mystery. The film follows master weaver and Haida elder Delores Churchill on a journey to understand the origins of a spruce root hat found with Kwäday Dän Ts'ínchi, the Long Ago Person Found, a 300-year-old traveler discovered in Northern Canada in a retreating glacier. Delores's quest crosses cultures and borders, involving artists, scholars and scientists, raising questions about the meaning of connection, knowledge and ownership.





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

When did you start working with yarn or fiber?

I learned to crochet when I was about 12 years old and have been doing some sort of fiber related activities ever since. About 30 years ago, a friend tried to teach me to knit, but it didn't take. Then about 15 years ago, Fran Slaterbeck suggested I take up knitting when I was really stressed out about my job. I was much more successful this time around and have been knitting ever since. When I retired, I decided I wanted to spin my own yarn. Once again, Fran was my teacher. At that point I didn't think I ever wanted to weave. However, I went on a trip to Scotland with a group from the Guild and that was that! I've been weaving now for about 6 or 7 years and can't imagine not being involved with all my fiber activities.

How did you learn/who taught you?

My Great Aunt and my mother were my crochet teachers. Fran Slaterbeck taught me to knit and to spin. Linda George taught me to weave. I've also taken quite a few classes at The Mannings and have learned a great deal from Tom Knisely. And I think I learn a lot by interacting with people in the Guild. I feel like I am always learning something new and I see that as one of the many benefits of our Guild.

Do you have a blog or website? If yes, what's the address?

No blog, no website, but I do enjoy following other people.

Do you have a public studio space? Where?

I rent a space in our Guild Studio at Liberty Town. I am very grateful that I have the opportunity to weave with other weavers. For most, weaving is a solitary activity by virtue of the equipment. It's not transportable like knitting. I also have a loom at home and I enjoy weaving alone, as well. But I think we are very fortunate to have our studio at Liberty Town, not just for weaving, but all our activities. I'd love to see more members spending time there with their spinning

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From the President's Desk

Something to consider... These Chair positions all used to have committees under them. However, over time, people have been less actively involved and the Chairs have had to work independently. Any of these Chairpersons would be delighted to have help with their jobs. People join groups for many reasons. I think our Guild is special because we share the common bond of our love of fiber and all the related activities. That will always be our focus and may be enough to meet your needs.

FSWG Job Descriptions

President:

- *Officiate at Guild and Board meetings*
- *Liaison with Liberty Town and other organizations on the Guild's behalf*
- *Appoint committees as appropriate or required*
- *Facilitate the resolution of questions or issues regarding the Guild*

Vice President:

- *Preside over Guild/Board meetings when the president is absent*
- *Establish and publish a schedule of programs for each meeting for the year*

Secretary:

- *Collect the one time sales fee and notify the Treasurer of the member's acceptance*

- *Establish and maintain the list of refreshment volunteers and the months they agreed to serve refreshments*
- *Remind members when it is their turn to provide refreshments*
- *Make all arrangements for the Guild Holiday Party*

Board Member at Large:

- *Serve on the Board and provide additional information and/or assistance to the President or other Board members*

Change to By-Laws Regarding Dues

The Board met after the regular meeting in February. One topic of discussion was the collection of dues. Currently the Bi-Laws state "Dues are collected starting in September for the next calendar year. Any member neglecting to pay dues by January 15 will be dropped from the Guild roll and will forfeit Guild benefits until rejoined

ing the Guild." This seems to have caused some confusion. Members seem to think they have that window to pay and then if they pay in January one year they have continued to pay in January. This creates a bookkeeping problem and means the roster has to be updated repeatedly. The Board proposes the following change.

"Guild dues are due at the September meeting. Any member neglecting to pay their dues by the December meeting will be dropped from the Guild roll and will forfeit Guild benefits until rejoining the Guild."

Hopefully, this will clarify when dues are due. Anyone who has been paying in January, you have actually been paying for something that was due in September anyway, so this doesn't change your status. And this change means members are dropped at the end of the same year that their dues were due. An additional change is the

Where have you traveled?



What do you enjoy most about being a guild member?



Art Attack



The Fredericksburg Art Attack is scheduled for Sat., Sept. 17, 10 AM - 4 PM. Guild members who wish to participate do not need a permit, but they should register individually on the following web site: artattackfred.com.







People living in western Spotsylvania, there are two alternative paths. Take Lake Anna parkway to Spotsy HS, then either turn on post oak road and follow it through the country to the sharp right hand turn onto Doolin Road and take Doolin until it ends at Mine run. Turn left and mine run meets Rt 20 just east of Edwards store. This is a real backroad trip in the middle of nowhere - but the road does have a center stripe.

OR continue on Lake Anna Parkway until it ends at 522, turn right and 522 meets Rt 20. (I put little block on first map to highlight where 522 is). This is about 10 minutes longer, but also a little less out in the middle of nowhere. And you can usually go 50-55mph.





Project Name: My Temperature Year 2015

Project Owner: Lesley Reynolds

Craft: Weaving

Started: January 16 2015

Yarn: Knit Picks Palette Yarn

EPI / PPI: 20 epi x 20 ppi

Project Summary: In January 2015 a podcaster featured a knitting project that recorded the high temperature of each day in two rows of knitting. Each color corresponds to a particular temperature range. I started the project twice, but nothing really felt right and it was hard for me to keep up. Part of the problem is that I am not in love with the yarn.

It's not as soft and the twist not as tight as I normally like. I finally decided that the best way to achieve project success was to shift gears from knitting to weaving. So now, every two warp threads is a day, and instead of a scarf, the project has turned into a wrap/throw. I'm now winding the warp, so stay tuned for project updates.
