

BARN LOOM RAISING!

The recent Barn Loom Raising was a wonderful success - with guild members working together to reassemble this weaving gem after decades alone in a dark, silent basement. The history of this loom is not certain but the most recent owner shared that it had come from West Virginia more than twenty years ago and felt the loom had originally been crafted in either West Virginia or North Carolina. Guild member Linda George, who has woven on similar looms and even helped assemble one some time ago, was the source of our insight into discovering how this loom should go together. She told us to look for Roman Numerals carved into the ends of the main beams - evidently they were often marked this way.

The group that worked on getting this loom put together were masters at teamwork, talking ideas out, moving heavy timbers into a variety of positions, and figuring out what the maker had intended all along. Touching and seeing the skill and precision that went into creating this treasure from our history was an absolutely awesome experience than none of us will soon forget.

The loom was disassembled that same day and is securely stacked in a dry shed, awaiting the time when a new owner claims her. If you know of any person or organization that would be interested in preserving this loom, please send them to Aileen Campbell at newsletter_editor@fswguild.org

Changes to MAFA By-Laws (more details can be found here)

<u>There are two simple bylaws changes being proposed for adoption that reflect actual practices</u>:

- 1) An update to make the meeting dates more flexible and reflect that we are having business meetings by video conference instead of requiring them to be in person.
- 2) An update to reflect that we actually have a compilation done which is sufficient for our situation, not a review which is more involved and costly. In accounting there are three tiers of service: compilation, review, and audit. Given our size and activities, we do not need a review or audit at this time.

Also, MAFA member guild dues are changing:

25 or fewer members: \$30

26-50 members: \$70

51-100 members: \$100

101-150 members: \$150

Amalgamated Weaving

Amalgamated Weaving is a new way to design some very complicated weaving patterns. A good thing about it is that the computer will do it for you. If you don't have a pattern to test just go to handweaving.net and use one of their patterns. Also handweaving.net has instruction and the program to change your pattern to an amalgamation. It's best to start with at least an 8 shaft pattern. Putting it through the amalgamation program adds some complicated design to your pattern. When you are finished the program keeps the new design and puts your pattern back to the original number of shafts.

The amalgamated weaving program was created by Alice Schlein. Alice has a monograph on her web site about amalgamated weaving.

WEAVERS' WISDOM

From The Weavers Guild of Boston

In designing stripes, a single thread in a stripe gives the effect of a running stitch.

To be positively sure a sample will work when you transpose it to a large piece, the sample should be at least 8-14 inches wide. If the sample is smaller, the sett will be off when made into a bigger piece.


KNITTING KNOTES

Create a neat edge with an easy chain slip stitch.

No more nubby garter stitch edges. The slipped chain creates an attractive braid-like edge along the right side.

There are several ways to to a chain edge, but this is the easiest way:

- 1. At the end of every tow, slip the last stitch with the yarn in front.
- 2.At the beginning of the next row, knit the slipped stitch.

Tom has taught many, many spinning classes and is quite expert at explaining spinning. The book is beautiful and full of step by step instructions and photographs showing every aspect of spinning. Tom starts with choosing a fleece and washing it and then goes through all the steps for preparing it for spinning. There are 19 photos with captions to go along with just the carding section. The book takes you through the entire process ending with a completed blanket of hand spun yarns. I'm quite sure anyone could learn to spin from this lovely and lovingly written book.


