Next Guild Roundtable (Open to All Guild Members) is a presentation by Melissa Weaver Dunning, July 26 at 7 PM: Traditional Knitting from England, Ireland, Scotland, and the Shetland Islands. Many of the foundations of traditional knitting come to us from England, Ireland, and Scotland: Fishermen's ganseys, Aran cable knitting, Fair Isle multicolored patterned knitting and delicate Shetland lace. We will explore each of these traditions through images of garments and knitters, old and new. Melissa Weaver Dunning is an avid tartan & linen weaver, a skilled spinner and a compulsive knitter. She loves to share the history and context of traditional textile arts and to pass on the efficient techniques of time-honored skills. She lives in the beautiful Shenandoah Valley of Virginia. Melissa is also a traditional hand-weaver working on antique equipment to produce 18th and 19th century style textiles. She has had the great good fortune to study with Scottish master weaver and singer Norman Kennedy since 1980. She is dedicated to carrying on some of the wealth of tradition gleaned from this apprenticeship both in weaving and in music. This roundtable is open to all MAFA guild members.


So far, they have taught 6 new spinners, and there are two new students lined up for this Sunday. Two students have joined the guild so far. At least one wants to rent a wheel.

#### **WEAVERS' WISDOM**

From The Weavers Guild of Boston

Advice from weaving experts:

Taken from Handwoven magazine

From Rosalie Neilson, <u>weaving teacher</u>, Oregon College of Art and Crafts and guilds around the country:

On mistakes: I've made every mistake there is in weaving, and know that for every problem there is a solution ... not always an easy one, but something that can be solved. For a beginning weaver who forgot to put the warp OVER the back beam? Put a dowel under the warp, and tie it to the back beam. Crossed warps, and incorrect threads on heddles, are easily corrected as well. When it comes to weaving, if there's an unexpected texture or pattern, it becomes a Design Element, especially if it can be repeated. For a really obvious mistake that can't be corrected ... like four inches from where the weaving continues ... don't take out what's already been placed. Rather call it the "spirit trail" as in the Navajo weaving tradition where a mistake is purposely made so the spirit can escape the confines of the rug.

From Peggy Osterkamp, <u>weaver, teacher, and author</u> of the recently released Weaving for Beginners:

Things to know before you throw a shuttle: Throw the shuttle into the correct open shed. Take out the shuttle so the weft is in the shed on a diagonal [as shown in the figure at right]. Holding onto the shuttle, snug up the weft to the outside warp threadthe side where the shuttle entered the shed-just so it touches and barely moves that outside thread. Then, swing the beater and gently place the weft next to the previously woven weft. You do not want to actually beat it as the name implies. You are simply placing the weft against the one woven before it. Now, while the beater is toward you after placing the weft, change the shed. Then, swing the beater back toward the heddles and begin the process again. The steps are: throw the shuttle, beat in the weft, and change the shed. I like the rhythm of saying: "Throw, beat, change the shed." That's 4 counts, with "the shed" as one beat. (On the fourth beat you're pushing the beater back toward the shafts.)

#### **KNITTING KNOTES**

## Crochet provisional cast on

Step 1: With your waste yarn, make a slip knot and place it on your crochet hook.

Step 2: Take your knitting needle and hold it in your other hand, with the working yarn behind the needle.

Step 3: Grab the working yarn with the crochet hook and draw it through the loop on the hook, wrapping the yarn around the knitting needle.

Step 4: Bring the working yarn back behind the knitting needle. Rep steps 3 – 4 until the you have cast on your desired number of stitches.

Chain 3 or 4 loops at the end of your cast on row to identify which end you will be removing your waste yarn from.

When you are ready to pick up your stitches, insert your knitting needle into the loops from the first row of your main color. Then gently pull the waste yarn. It should unravel nicely, leaving you with live stitches on your needle.

## Long tail cast-on

Step 1: Take a length of yarn from your ball of yarn.

Tip – For the long tail measure about one inch per stitch. How many stitches will be dependent on your pattern

Warning! – If you do not measure enough yarn to begin with you may run out and will have to start over. You can always cut off extra yarn when you finish casting on.

Step 2: Make a slip knot and insert the needle into the loop. Tighten slip knot onto needle.

Warning! – When casting on a lot of stitches the yarn has a tendency to untwist. Make sure the long tail is closest to you so you can easily retwist the yarn as you go.

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Step 3: With your pottom three ringers grap both pieces of yarn and hold them in your palm.

Step 4: Take your index finger and thumb and push them through the two pieces of yarn.

Step 5: Shift your thumb and forefinger backwards to pull the yarn tight.

Step 6: Take the tip of your needle and pick up the bottom piece of yarn closest to your body.

Step 7: Swing the needle around and under the yarn wrapped around your index finger.

Step 8: Pull the needle through the loop of yarn on your thumb.

Step 9: Release the yarn around the thumb.

Step 10: Pull the yarn closest to your body tight on the needle.

Repeat steps 6-10 until you have reached the desired amount of stitches on your needle.

Tip – If your pattern calls for a loose cast on use two needles together to cast on instead of one.
