What is Roc Day?

The ancient English holiday called Roc day or Distaff day is celebrated on the 7th of January following the 12th night, which marked the end of the Christmas celebration. On this day the women were expected to return to the chore of spinning. A distaff is a tool used to hold unspun fibers. The fiber is loosely wrapped around the distaff. The distaff can beheld under the arm when drop spinning, or attached to a spinning wheel.

Traditionally, the men returned to work on Plough Monday, the first Monday following the 12th night.

HOW THE PATRONS SHOW WORKS:

<u>WHAT:</u> The Patron Show is all artwork donated by our very own artists as a fundraiser for LibertyTown. If you are interested, you may decide to purchase a voucher to come to a really fun event with food and drinks AND go home with one of the artworks!


<u>WHEN:</u> The opening reception is May___. Public voucher sales start at 5PM on May ___. The drawing will be held on May ___ from 7-9 PM for those who purchase vouchers.

WHERE: In the gallery, IN PERSON this year!

<u>HOW:</u> How does it work? Each voucher entitles you to one piece of art in the show...but the twist is you only get to pick your piece when your voucher number is drawn. If your number is selected last, you automatically get to be first the following year if you buy a voucher.

HOW MUCH: The vouchers are \$175 plus sales tax! It may seem like a lot, but each piece of art is worth well more than that, and we try to give you a really good spread of food at the drawing.

WHO: Everyone is invited to see the show as usual on First Friday, May 5th and all month long. But only those who choose to buy a voucher may come to the Big Drawing event on May ___

Register for \$30 and receive a 10" bisque-fired ceramic plate to decorate with paint, collage, fabric, mosaic, or any other medium, or create your own 10" decorated plate.

Return completed plates to the gallery on February 24 or 25, 11am-6pm. Plates will be exhibited from February 27 through March 31. The Opening Night Reception will be on First Friday, March 1, 6-9pm.

Artists have the option to sell their plates. There is a 30% commission to cover costs and to support the families of cancer patients who struggle with daily needs.

Artful Dimensions reserves the right to reject a plate if inappropriate for display. Unsold plates can be picked up March 31, April 2, or April 3, from 11am – 6pm

She made major innovations in the field of functional materials and at the same time she expanded the possibilities of single weavings and individual artworks. She was also an adventurous graphic artist who took printmaking technique into previously uncharted territory.

Learn how to hand-paint two warps in different color palettes and beam them together to weave one luminous fabric on their loom. Saturday, February 10, at 1 pm ET An Introduction to Bead Weaving with David Heustess. Join David Heustess as he shares with you the basics of bead weaving, including right angle bead weaving (RAW). This "off

loom" bead weaving technique can create a beaded fabric that has a wonderful drape that can be used for ties, scarves, jewelry, beaded tapestry designs and more. Saturday, February 10, at 2 pm

Echo and Jin: Variations on a Theme with Denise
Kovnat. Working with a variety of yarns, tieups, treadlings and setts (if you choose), you'll weave a series of designs in Echo and Jin (Turned Taqueté). You'll explore the interaction of color and structure, using two to four colors in the warp and a variety of colors in the weft. Saturday, February 24, at 1 pm

Sculptural Vessels with Right Angle Bead Weaving with David Heustess. Participants in this class will explore different ways to use Right Angle Weaving (RAW) with beads to create and construct one of a kind sculptural objects and vessels. Saturday, February 24, at 2 pm

This is an electronic submission and will go to the committee chairperson. You may also complete a paper submission. The forms are on the Bulletin Board at LT and in the Handbook which was recently distributed. Please leave your paper copy on the seat at Judy Klehm's loom. You will be contacted and told when to bring your items to Liberty Town. The \$10.00 review fee will be collected when you drop off your items to be reviewed. Future review dates will be scheduled. Membership & Dues

As of 1/03/2024, the guild has grown to 63 members (though 13 have not paid the 2024 dues).
